The initiative 'Growth in Transition' is organising its fourth international conference, entitled 'Europe's Transformation: Where People Matter', which will bring together 700 participants, on 14-15 November 2018 at the Austria Center Vienna. Austria will be holding the EU Presidency in the second half of the year 2018. The conference will be part of the Trio-Presidency EE-BG-AT which focuses on eco-innovation. During the two-day event, plenary and parallel sessions will feature high level keynote speakers as well as relevant stakeholder organisations, companies, start-ups and researchers.

The conference will address the transformation towards a resilient and sustainable society from very different perspectives. Conference topics will range from the role of the finance sector to theories underlying the economy and the measuring of people's well-being. At the same time, social and distributional aspects, democracy and quality of life will be addressed as issues which play a crucial role in the transformation of society. A special focus will be put on the sustainable management of natural resources and the possibilities of a low-carbon society. In view of the challenge of a sustainable transformation of society, the role of the media in shaping public opinion and in producing fake news will be examined. The digital revolution has already transformed the world we live in. The question raised at the conference will be whether there is a chance of shaping a sustainable digital economy. Gender equality is a key factor in bringing about a profound system transformation. At the conference the role of women in traditionally male dominated sectors will be explored.
